Emergency Management Act

- Powers and duties of Minister and Local Authorities
- Establishment of an Emergency Management Organization
 - Head of EMO
 - Powers and duties
- Establishment of a Territorial Planning Committee
- Declaration of States of Emergency (Local and Territorial)
 - Direction and control of emergency operations
 - Extraordinary powers



Local Authorities

The elected councils of community governments are the Local Authority for the purposes of the Act, and as such are responsible for the development and implementation of community emergency plans to reasonably protect the general public, and minimize property damage and loss during emergencies.

- Have an emergency management organization (emergency response committee)
- Appoint a local coordinator
- Have emergency plans and programs



NWT Emergency Plan

Provides the structure and guidelines on how the GNWT and its partners work together to support community governments and meet a collective responsibility in responding to territorial emergencies.

- GNWT Department responsibilities
- EMO responsibility for coordinated responses involving multiple departments – consequence management of hazard impacts.
- Use of ICS as response model



MACA EMO Structure

Territorial EMO:

- Located in Yellowknife
- Emergency Operations Centre
- 2 dedicated staff
- NWT Emergency Plan

MACA's 5 Regional Offices

- Inuvik, Norman Wells, Fort Simpson, Fort Smith (Hay River), Yellowknife.
- Emergency Operations Centres
- NWT Emergency Plan



Fort McPherson – at Risk preparedness

Katlodeeche First Nation – some flood damage

Hay River – some flood damage

Northwest Territories

Current EMO Activities

- Monitoring flood risk and advising at risk communities and key stakeholders.
- Supporting Jean Marie River and Fort Simpson with evacuation support, emergency supplies, risk information, advice.
- Supporting at risk communities with risk information, planning advice and supporting preparation activities.



South Slave Activities

 Supporting Fort Simpson and Jean Marie River evacuee sheltering and care in Fort Smith, Hay River and Fort Providence.

 Supporting Hay River and K'atl'odeeche First Nation in assessing damage and understanding the Disaster Assistance Policy



Dehcho Activities

 Coordinating GNWT support to Jean Marie River and Fort Simpson.

 Responding to requests for assistance from Jean Marie River and Fort Simpson

Providing advice and support in assessing damage



Sahtu Activities

- Monitoring risk conditions and providing advice to at risk communities on preparedness activities.
- Responding to requests to support preparedness activities.
- Assessing available sheltering capacity and transportation needs should a community evacuation be required
- Community flood watch activity ongoing

Beaufort Delta Activities

- Monitoring risk conditions and providing advice to at risk communities on preparedness activities.
- Responding to requests to support preparedness activities.
- Assessing available sheltering capacity and transportation needs should a community evacuation be required
- Community flood watch activity ongoing

Priorities – Immediate

- Information and advice to impacted residents and community officials
- Coordination and collaboration of Damage Assessment of GNWT facilities and critical infrastructure repairs
- Demobilization of evacuation centres and return of evacuees
- Survey of flood water levels in impacted communities
- Detailed damage assessment of residential properties not assessed under public housing or insurance
- Contracting of emergency work to limit further damage of impacted properties.

Priorities - Immediate

- Requests received to have Cabinet apply the Disaster Assistance Policy (DAP) – approval granted
- Establish Disaster Assistance Committee (DAC), responsible for overseeing applications for assistance; make claim for federal assistance
- Intent to establish DAC as a territorial Committee
- Whole-of-government approach, senior management and MACA regional superintendent membership.
- Several significant issues to address: claim process; liaison with Canada on band housing and other matters; after action assessment, etc.



Disaster Assistance Policy

- DAP is an assistance program it is not a compensation or insurance program
- Disaster assistance is limited to essential items
- Amount of financial assistance:
 - 80% of total amount of total eligible costs
 - Maximum amount payable per applicant is \$100,000



Priorities – Longer Term

- Interim and long term housing solutions for residents who cannot return home
- Disaster Assistance claims process
- Claim for disaster assistance to the federal government under the Disaster Financial Assistance Arrangements
- Flood mitigation planning and support for access to federal disaster mitigation funding.
